In previous years, when dental appointments were difficult to get, promises of correction were accepted, and the number of gold stars was high. When it was discovered that students were not keeping these appointments, requirements were more strictly enforced. Consequently, this year only those who have been passed by the school dentist, or present certificates from their dentist or doctor, will be included in the gold star lists.

Last year, out of an enrollment of 1,582, 753 students had all their correctable defects remedied. Fiftynine and half per cent of these were girls; 40.5 per cent were boys.

Mrs. Kelly expressed the hope that there would be 1000 gold stars this year. The certificates have been ordered, and each will be personally signed by Mr. W. E. Evans, the principal, Mrs. Elizabet h Sharpe, health supervisor, Mrs. Kelly, health teacher, and Mrs. Margaret Line and Mrs. Sheffer, physical education instructors.

"Next year seniors who have been gold stars three successive years will be given a special reward," announced Mrs. Kelly, "so lower classmen should begin now to earn this worthwhile award. Carrying defects discovered in the tenth grade all through school is most unwise since early correction will prevent sometimes hazardous results. Many people in later life develop heart disease caused by bad tonsil germs which can also injure other vital organs of the body.

"Your all-important eyes, if in need of glasses, should be taken care of immediately. If they have not already been checked, Mrs. Sheffer or Coach Stephenson will be glad to do it for you."

Those who have not had their throats checked during high school will have the chance when the school doctor comes. If the students' tonsils have been removed, he may bring a note from home saying so.

Hearing-audiometer tests will be given to juniors and seniors, but sophomores will not have an opportunity to take the test.

All students will be marked OK on both nutrition and hearing unless some defect is found. There has been little malnutrition found, said Mrs. Kelly

Some effort will be made to check "conspicuously under-par students," said Mrs. Kelly. "In this way we can perhaps catch early cases of tuberculosis."

B&WAgain Wins CSPA 1st Place

The Convention is held in the spring of each year in order that workers on school newspapers all over the nation may meet and exchange ideas with each other. The results of the contests are also announced at these sessions, which are held at Columbia University.

At the opening session the acting president of Columbia greeted the representatives — some 3.500 from thirty-six states. A Columbia student addressing the group told the group of their important responsibility in framing world

Among the meetings we attended was the one led by the assistant managing editor of the New York World - Telegram, the leading Scripps - Howard newspaper, and one of the largest in the country. The group held a forum on "Makeup Problems.'

That afternoon we saw the radio comedian Bob Hawk, who gave a mass interview to the students. He also had a "mock broadcast" in which he interviewed some of the editors there.

On Friday's session we heard a representative of the New York Herald - Tribune, who discussed chances for journalism as a career. He said that it was an overcrowded profession, with room for few women, and that only the fittest had a chance for success.

Friday afternoon, we had the pleasure of seeing Miss Jinx Falkenburg, the famous model, movie star, and tennis champ, and her husband, who was war correspondent. She told of her career, and of her entertaining soldiers abroad during the war. She said she didn't

know how she had become so famous. "I don't act, I don't sing, I don't dance." But her part in the show spoke for itself. On the second half of Friday

afternoon's menu, we saw Milton Caniff, creator of "Steve Canyon," and former drawer of "Terry and the Pirates," and Al Capp, creator of "Li'l Abner." Caniff told of how he drew "Steve Canyon" by using a drawing board as he talked.

The final event of the convention was the banquet which was held at the Astor Hotel on Times Square. Guest speaker of the occasion was lecturer Hans Christian Adamson, refugee of the lifeboat on which Eddie Rickenbacker and his crew were marooned for so long. In addition to telling of his rescue, he also spoke on the job of the press.
