Officers were installed, committee reports were given, business completed, and the meeting adjourned until next year. We will ever be thankful to our D.E. class for electing us and allowing us this very rewarding experience and to Mr. Garrett who accompanied us and gave us so much help and support.

Judy Turner Wins D.A.R. Award

Senior, Judy Turner has been selected to receive the D.A.R.'s School Good Citizen's Award for 1962. The award is presented yearly by the Daughters of the American Revolution, to the senior girl from each school, chosen by its faculty as its outstanding citizen.

Three girls from each school are chosen, from whom one is selected to receive the award. The selection is made according to these four qualities: dependability — truthfulness, loyalty; service — cooperation, courtesy; leadership — personality, self-control, ability to assume leadership; patriotism — unselfish interest in family, school, community, and nation.

As Holston's Best Citizen she will receive a pin and a certificate and will be entitled to enter the district contest. To enter the district contest, she must write an essay entitled, "Prove All Things." As winner of the district award she would be eligible for the state contest and then, the national award.

GRADUATE HONORED; MURRIAN CHOSEN

Hugh Rainey, a 1962 Holston graduate, won first prize in the state in a car-designing contest. Hugh was awarded a trophy by the contest sponsor, the Fisher Body Craftsman Guild. The trophy was presented by Miss Mildred Doyle, superintendent of schools, who also announced that Bob Murrian is one of the two chosen from Tennessee in the Senate Youth

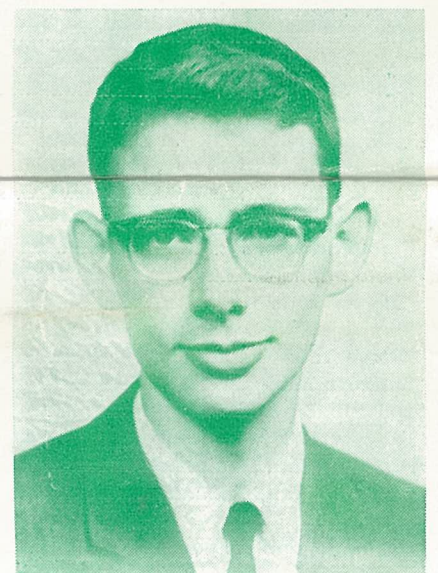
Paul Wyatt, Holston senior, has been selected national runnerup in the National Council of Teachers of English Competition. He is one of 870 students commended by the NCTE for proficiency in high school English. This is Holston's second consecutive year to have a runnerup in the competition.

Chosen last spring to represent Holston, Paul competed with 6,200 students for the NCTE award. He is the only winner from Knox County and was included in 20 Tennessee winners and runnerups. Contestants were judged by a series of tests and an original essay. Paul was given the topic, "The Meaning of Courage."

The council recommends winning students for 1963 college scholarships. In the past years 99% have been accepted by the college of their choice, and 80% have received financial grants.

Mr. Knisley, Mrs. Connelly, and Mrs. Castle have been Paul's English teachers at Holston.

Holston's first winner was Mary Lynwood Thaxton, who transferred to Webb.



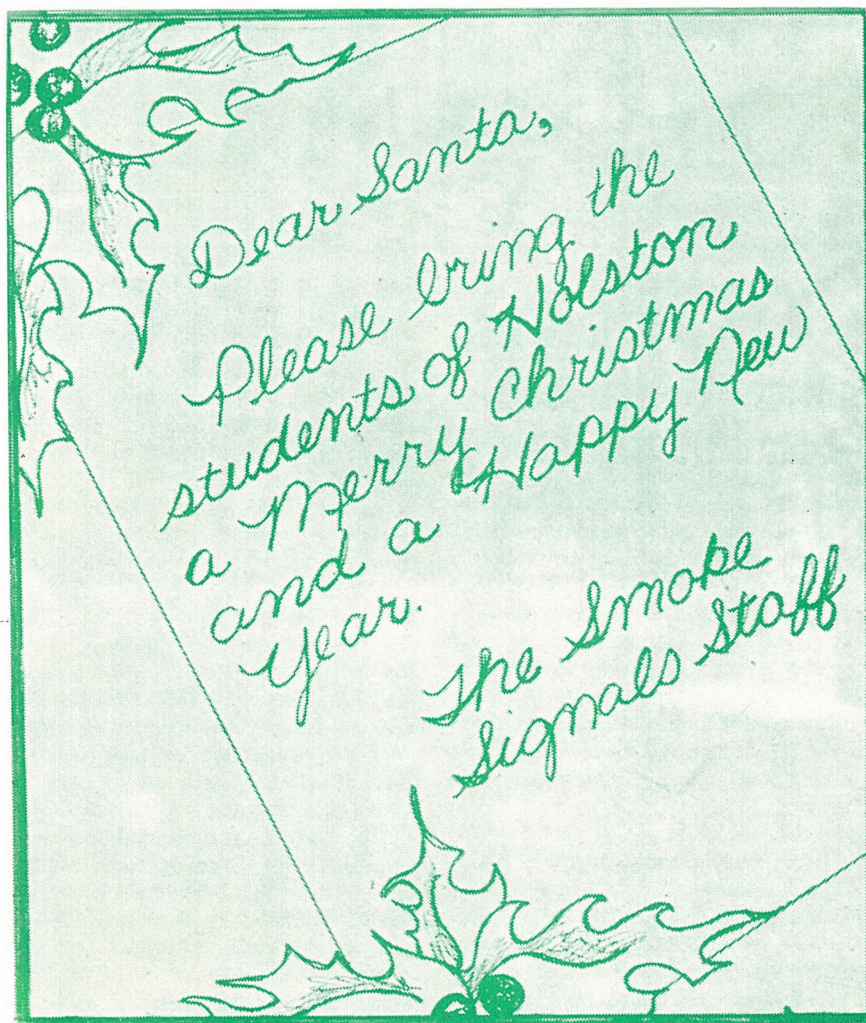

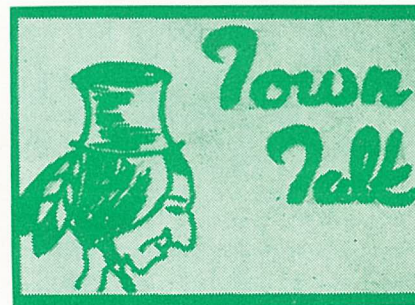
"AND HIS NAME WILL BE CALLED"

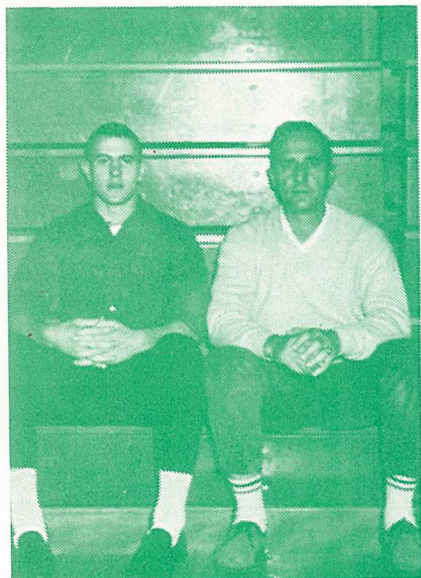
Sophomore Is Bowl Queen Candidate

The Christian Students Organization has been bringing old clothing to school to distribute to needy children in county schools.

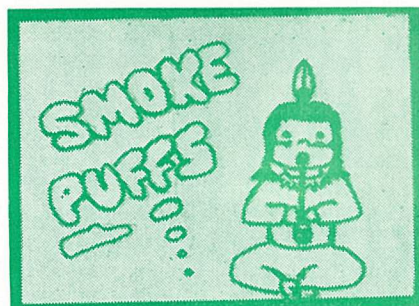

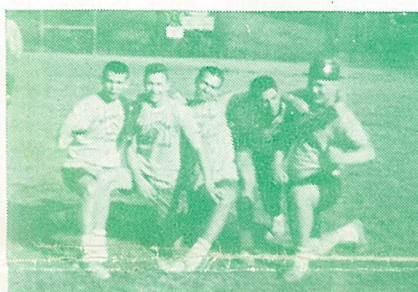
MURRIAN NAMED "ACADEMIC ATHLETE"

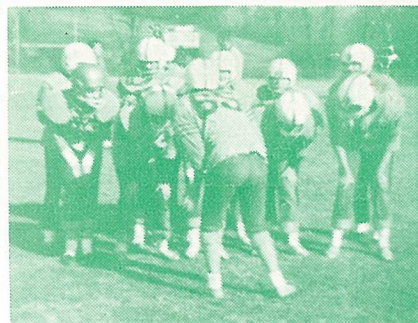
