

The Season of Lent

The word **Lent** comes from the Anglo-Saxon **lencthen**, meaning "spring." The season, which begins on Ash Wednesday, includes those forty days, other than Sundays, before Easter. The forty-day period has many symbolic origins: the time Moses spent on Mount Sinai, the forty years' wandering by the Israelites in the wilderness, Christ's forty days of temptation, and his forty hours in the tomb.

Gregory the Great, an early Pope, urged that Lent be a time of discipline. He said, "we, . . . through the past year have lived too much for ourselves, (and) should mortify ourselves to our creator in the tenth of the year through obstinence." In the early Church, Lent was a time of instructing those who were to be baptized. Then, as now, those who observed Lent expressed a feeling of remorse as they approached Easter Sunday. Today, many give up some pleasure during Lent as a preparation for Easter, remembering One who gave up the greatest pleasure man enjoys—that of living.

On Sunday, February the third, the team matched wits with East High School and won by a land slide of 400 to 180. Paul Wyatt, team captain, answered most of the questions with Bob and Judy backing him up. Judy answered the bonus questions.

The next Sunday, the Holston team met the team from Carter and again won, this time by a score of 300 to 100. Paul answered 20 ten-point questions, Bob, three ten-point questions, and Judy answered 1 ten-point question and 2 bonus questions.

The team, having won three games, will now retire until the run-off. They may compete with other three-time winning schools to determine a final winner.



Miss Hayes was one of the first name stars of the stage to go into radio. She was also a pioneer in television and has played many starring roles in that medium, most memorable of which was "Mary, Queen of Scots."

Recently Miss Hayes appeared in the Knoxville Auditorium with Maurice Evans in "A Program for Two Players."

Bob Murrian Reports On D. C. Trip

During the week of January 27 to February 2, I was privileged to participate in the first United States Senate Youth Program (S. Y. P.) The idea behind the program is to give 102 young people from all over America a working knowledge of the United States Senate. The program is entirely financed by The William Randolph Hearst Foundation.

Two teenagers from each state and two from the District of Columbia were selected for the expense-paid trip.

The greatest thing about the trip was the noted speakers who took their valuable time to tell us about some phase of government. Among these speakers were: Sen. Hubert Humphrey, Sen. Tom Kuchel, Sen. Mike Mansfield, Speaker John McCormack, Sen. Estes Kefauver, Pierre Salinger, Sen. Claiborn Dell, and finally the President himself.

Our group was given "priority" treatment by the Senate. We even got a police escort from the Pentagon to the Senate during rush hour traffic. We were allowed to go onto the Senate and house floor (something verv rarely done by visitors). We toured the Supreme Court. White House, Pentagon, and the Capital building.

On Tuesday I spent the day in Sen. Kefauver's office and got a fairly good idea of the workings of a Senator's office.

On Friday we were given a tour of Washington itself. We visited such places as Arlington National Cemetery. the Marine Memorial, The Smithsonian Institute, The National Art Gallery (ves. we saw the Mona Lisa), and the National Archives.

Our visit in Washington enabled us to see the things that every American should try to see in his lifetime.

The Holston High freshmen missed an undefeared season in the freshsmen tournament when Alcoa slipped by the Warriors, 42-39. This was the first loss for coach Dwayne Carter's amazing freshmen.

The freshmen finished out the regular season with an 10-0 workslate. They entered the tourney as the topseeded team, but fell before Alcoa in the finals.

In the opening round of the tourney, the Warriors notched an impressive victory over Powell. Pulling away to a 16-5 first quarter lead, the Warriors continued to roll on to their 62-40 win. Frank Hall and Dick Stansberry lead the scoring with 18 and 11 respectively.

In the quarter-finals the baby Warriors met a fired up team from Halls; upset victor over Bearden in the first round. The freshmen stormed back in the second half to take a 41-35 decision.
