# HOLSTON IS T. V. QUIZ CHAMPION

### Outstanding Holston Seniors Are Recognized

Holston seniors who have done superior work in their studies and in their leadership of extra-curricular activities were recognized before the student body in the Senior Awards Assembly of May 24.

The 1963 class has co-valedictorians Paul Wyatt and Betty Owenbey, both of whom have a 4 point average. The third highest average has been earned by Bob Murrian, the salutatorian.

Becky Lewis — full scholarship to University of Tennessee Another trophy now graces Holston's rapidly filling trophy case. The first or its kind, it is Holston's T.V. Quiz leam's Championship Trophy. The T.V. Classroom Quiz was started on an exploratory and experimental basis last December. Its purposes was to promote interest in scholarship and to acquaint the public with the activities of the Knoxville Chamber of Commerce.

The first teams to play were Central and Young. Holston was scheduled to play the winner of this game. By defeating Central, East, and Carter on January 20th, February 3rd, and February 10th, respectively, Holston became the first school to have a thrice-victorious team. This made them eligible for the series of run-offs which were to be held between teams which fell into a like category.

Holston's team was under the supervision of its two sponsors, Mr. Knisley and Mr. Foxx, who chose the members of the team on the basis of scores which were kept during practice sessions similar to the actual T.V. program. After Judy Pinkston, Bob Murrian, and Paul Wyatt were chosen for the team with extra support from Danny Whittle and Harold Terry as alternates, they began an intense drilling session which lasted for several afternoons until the date of the first game. Each team member received a twenty-five dollar sav-

ings bond for the team's first three appearances. As a group they won three television sets for the school.

The team was a specialized co-operative effort: Bob and Paul were to cover most of the general questions, and Judy was to specialize on "bonus" questions and music questions. Paulled the team's scoring through all its games, Judy ranked second, and Bob third. In the determining game, the final score stood 350 to 190. Of these 350 points, Paul scored 240, Judy 90 and Bob 20.

In the run-offs for the championship, the team names and their opponents were drawn and placed in the position in which they would play, according to the winner of the previous game On April 22nd Holston defeated Powell, on the 29th South, and on May 13th West, making them the first Champion T.V. Classroom Quiz team.

In the final game the team answered such questions as: What is the common name for acetyl salicylic acid? What's the capital of Ireland? and What does the term "allegro" mean? to lead continuously throughout the game. This fine team has brought another very distinguished honor to our school, and has also established Holston as one of the most academically requiring institutions of learning in Knoxville and Knox County.

# Smoke Signals Rated Excellent

Smoke Signals, now ending its second year as a printed newspaper, has been rated Excellent by the Tennessee High School Press Association. Eccellent is one rating higher than the Good rating the newspaper received last year.

Holston is one of six Knoxville schools having Excellent papers this year. The other five are East High, Blue and Gray; Fulton High The Falcon Quill; Halls High, Red and White; Rule High, Bear Facts; and South High, Rocket's Tale.

Nearly one hundred newspapers entered the state-wide competition. Twelve publications were rated Superior, one rating above Excellent. Of these twelve, three were rated A'l-Tennessee, which is the highest rating.

Forty-two newspapers received the Excellent rating, while twenty-two were rated Good. Stencil-duplicated newspapers were judged and rated separately from the printed publications.

On behalf of the '62-'63 **Smoke Signals** Staff, I am honored to express our appreciation to Marilyn Sheeley, whose untiring efforts as editor have made this year's newspaper a success. 
