First Thanksgiving

Let us give thanks for our Thanksgiving. Our first Thanksgiving took place after the Pilgrims had been in the New World for nearly a year. The spring sowing had taken place and all the summer fields had been watched with great anxiety, for all knew that their lives depended upon the coming harvest. The summer crops came to a richness of fruition beyond all expectation, and late one day in the fall, Governor Bradford sent four men into the forests to shoot wild birds. "We will hold a harvest feast of Thanksgiving," he said and invited the Indians who had been friendly to the strangers to rejoice with the white men. The Indians came bearing gifts of venison, the harvest feast lasted three days.

This was the first Thanksgiving Day celebrated in America. George Washington perfectly expressed the spirit of the day in his Thanksgiving Proclamation in 1789:

Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful to His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection, aid and favors. Now therefore, I do recommend and assign the last Thursday in November, to be devoted by the people of the states to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that was; that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks for His fine care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

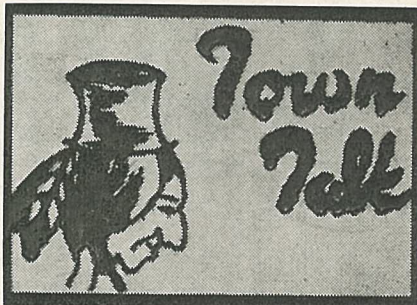
- Is it a sissy to be the first guy on the practice field?

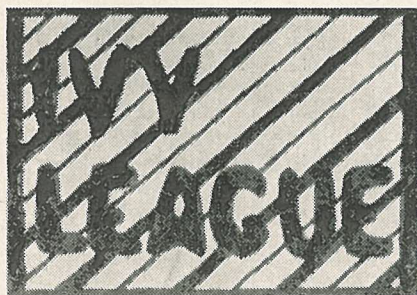

Dear Monkey Maniac,

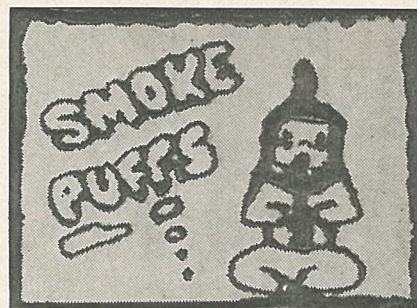

Sid Hankins, 5'10" Junior—A good playmaker who could develop into a good scorer.

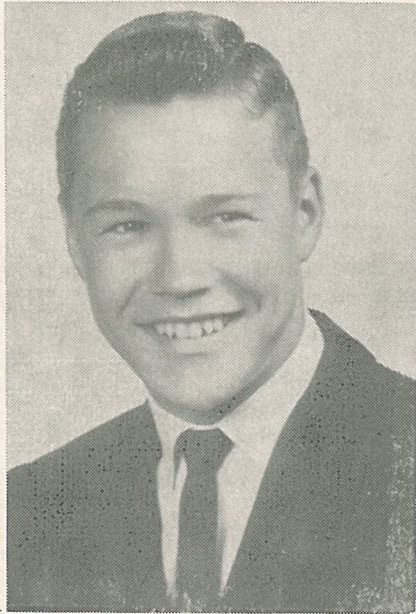
Frank Hall, 6'1", Sophomore—Outstanding hustler, good defensive man who is one of the top Soph prospects at Holston.
