At halftime, the queen finalists including Kathy Chesney, Pam Farris, Janet Graham, Beverly Kromer, Julia Lambert, Marsha Rhodes, Charlotte Shipe, Patsy Troutman, Charlotte Whittaker and Linda Wallace, rode around the Warrior field and were presented with their escorts. Second runner-up Kathy Chesney and first runner-up Patsy Troutman were presented trophies by last year's queen, Linda Warwick. Then the thrilling moment arrived. The 1964 Homecoming Queen, Julia Lambert, was crowned by Linda and presented the queen's trophy. The finalists then left the field to the tune of the Warrior fight song.

Saturday night was the annual Homecoming Dance, sponsored by the Senior Class. The theme of the dance was "Autumn to May" and the gym was beautifully decorated in orange and pink. The "Sierras" provided the music. The Homecoming Queen began her reign that night and, along with her court, was presented roses by our football captain, Gary Childress.

Johnson Elected In School Poll

In an effort to determine the most popular presidential candidate at Holston High, **Smoke Signals** held a mock election on October 5. Ballots were passed out to the homeroom groups with the names of Johnson and Goldwater appearing on the ballots. After the votes were recorded, President Lyndon B. Johnson's total vote was 517 to Arizona Senator Barry M. Goldwater's 314 votes.

On the human interest side of the mock election, several "write-in" votes were received. Among the leaders in this group were Alabama Governor George Wallace with ten votes, drummer Ringo Starr of the Beatles with five votes, multi-millionaire groceryman Cas Walker with four votes, Wilt with three votes, and Pennsylvania Governor William Scranton with two votes.

Other "favorites" receiving single votes were Alfred E. Newman, Dan Guernsey, Tomlinson, and Chili. Three ballots received expressed affiliation for Mr. Neither-one and three ballots received were found to be undecided. To round off our tally sheet, single votes were recorded for America and our own Mr. Underwood. This brought the number of votes cast to 868 out of approximately 1120 members of the student body.

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Editor's Notebook

What Ever Happened To Honesty?

In a time when men like Bobby Baker are allowed to go unpunished just because their shady deals involve prominent politicians, honesty seems a small commodity. It is one of the most important parts of our character, and yet we sacrifice it every day—sometimes with our contemporaries, sometimes with our parents, sometimes with our teachers.

Lies are the most common breach of honesty among students. Exaggeration, understatement, not giving a clear presentation of facts—these are all ways of lying. If, even once, another person catches us in one of these faults, we fall a little in his esteem. If we fall into the habit of dishonesty in small matters, our character image gradually lowers in the eyes of all around us. Many of us deceive our parents, also. Certainly we owe them the truth, but many times we don't tell them the entire story about our actions, our grades, and our friends. Remember that "a man is as good as his word" and act accordingly.

The other most common dishonesty among young people is cheating on school work. It is

practically a cliché to say that when one cheats, one only hurts himself, but it is important to remember it anyway. If you are planning to do anything with your life, you must have preparation. Education is absolutely vital to your future, unless you plan to be a common laborer forever. Increasingly, a college, business school, or trade school diploma is required to achieve any degree of success or prosperity. Cheating rather than learning in high school makes your prospects of passing in a college of any sort rather dim. No one can continue cheating in successively more advanced courses and not be discovered and punished eventually. Cheating should be avoided for purely selfish reasons.

A more important, but less tangible, reason for being honest is your moral character. Most of us give little thought to our moral character—we don't look at ourselves so objectively. However, we all wish to be well thought of by our associates, and this is only achieved by being dependable, friendly, and—above all—honest. When we realize that honesty, good behavior, and simple courtesy are necessary, not just "square", then we will progress.

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WARRIORS CONQUER TRADITIONAL FOE BOBCATS BOW 26 - 14

WARRIORS SMASH OWLS

Holston's Warriors are back on the winning track. A 38-6 trouncing of LaFollette gave Warrior fans hope for a split or sweep of the remaining two games. The way is rocky but the Warriors showed they have the spirit and desire to conquer it.

Playing without regular QB David Fair, the Warriors still were able to show scoring punch as soph QB Tommy Slack guided the Warriors with poise and savvy.

Held scoreless the first twelve minutes, the Warriors broke loose in the second quarter scoring 26 points.

Gary Childress started the rout with a five yard sweep for the first TB. Freshman Danny Shipp (brother of two former Warrior stalwarts) loomed the PAT through the uprights. Gaining the ball after a punt, the Warriors quickly scored. A 55 yard pass from Slack to halfback Norman Pratt netted 6 points as the senior speedster outran the entire Owl secondary.

Shipp converted and it was 14-0 Warriors.

A few plays later defensive demon Tommy Selby picked off Owl QB Jim Chadwell's pass and raced for a 50 yard TD. The PAT missed and it was 20-0 Warriors.

The alert Warriors scored on the ensuing kickoff. Larry Brice caught the LaFollette safety with a bone-crushing tackle causing the back to cough up the ball. Jess Burdette scooped up the loose pigskin and scored unscathed. The half ended with the Warriors on the long end of the above score.

Early in the 3rd quarter, the Warriors put 6 more points on the board. Selby intercepted another pass scoring from the Owl 20 yard line. It was now 32-0. LaFollette came right back and scored as QB Chadwell threw a seven yard strike to Halfback Cotton Childs in the end zone. The extra point was partially blocked. It was now 32-6.

Late in the 3rd quarter Larry Brice streaked ten yards up the middle for the final TD of the night. At the 3rd quarter it was 38-6 Holston.

Holston's Warriors, led by the passing combo of David Fair and Norman Pratt, threw a monkey wrench into Central's Optimist Bowl machinery by rolling over the Bobcats 26-14. It was Holston's first victory ever over the Fountain Citians and the first time in five years any team has scored four TD's on Central.

Fair and Pratt put on a great passing show as they teamed up 11 times for 147 yards and three TD's. Fair for the night completed 13 of 15 for 178 yards as well as playing a strong defensive game. The partisan Central crowd had little to cheer about as Holston racked up a great victory and as Coach Hoyt Carroll said "a great moment in Holston's football history."

Unable to move after the opening kickoff, Tom Selby punted to the Central 49. On Central's first play, Norm Pratt re-

covered a Bobcat "bobble" to give the Warriors the ball. Fair gave the Bobcat pass defense an early test by completing three passes for 13, 17, and 19, the latter to Pratt for a 6-0 Warrior lead they never relinquished.

Central couldn't move after the kickoff and as a result Holston started their next series on the Central 45. Three passes took the ball to the 11 yard line and a play later Fair found Pratt again for the second score of the night. Dan Shipp kicked the point and it was 13-0 Warriors at the quarter.

When the Bobcats again were stalled after 1 first down, Mayfield booted the ball to the Warrior 17. Eddie Treece immediately zoomed 13 to the 30. Then came the play that broke Central's back — well, almost! Cap-

tain Childress took a pitch out, cut over tackle, and simply out ran the secondary on a 70 yard scamper to paydirt. Shipp converted and it was Warriors 20, Kittycats 0.

Central's offensive machine uncranked and drove 90 yards for a touchdown late in the second quarter. It was capped off by a 25 yard strike from Mayfield to end Scott Bolton. The PAT was good and it was 20-7 at halftime.

Central's offense was pepped up at the outset of the third stanza, but surrendered a fumble to Eddie Treece at the Warrior 33. The Warriors then drove 67 yards for another TD. Fair to Pratt was again the combination on passes of 10, 29, and finally a 34 yard TD pass to Norm who caught it between two Central defenders right at the flag.

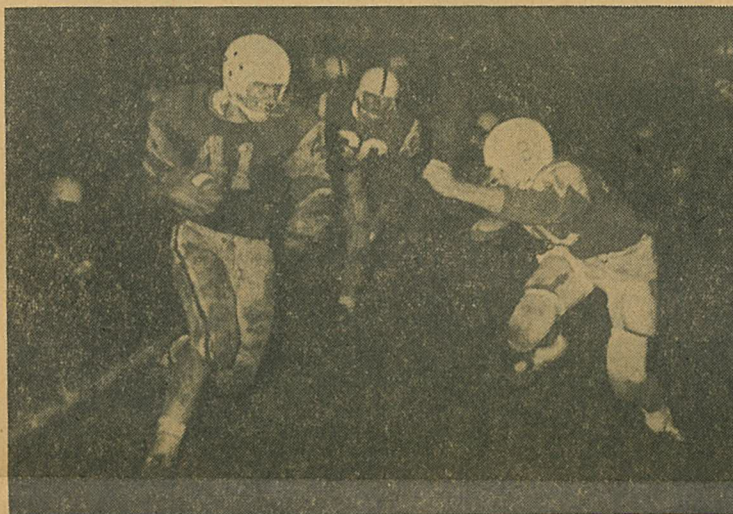
Central pushed across a late TD in the 4th quarter, but the damage was done. Holston was the victor 26-14. Their record is now 4-4 with only the battle for the "Joy-Jug" with East remaining. But win, lose, or draw, I'm sure every student is proud to say, "I am a Warrior!"

Post - Game Afterthoughts: David Fair and Norm Pratt were named Backs of the Week along with Young's Richard Pickens and South's Bill Young. It was well deserved. Holston's front wall was blocking better than this writer has ever seen. Tony Wolfenbarger and Mike Lindsey were able to keep Central's heavyweight tackles out of the backfield most of the night. A special pat on the back goes to them and the other linemen who blocked and tackled so well. Chili's 70-yard run was possibly the greatest of his career. His leadership along with Les Walker's has kept morale high.

Before a large homecoming crowd, the fired-up Bearden Bulldogs handed the Warriors their third straight loss 14-13. Again it was a one-point margin which has plagued the Warriors all season spelling the margin of defeat. Actually the Warriors beat the Bulldogs every place except on the scoreboard, racking up 14 first downs to Bearden's 4 and gaining more total yardage. But at the gun it was still 14-13 Bearden.

Holston put 7 points on the board in the 1st quarter as sophomore Tommy Slack sneaked over from the 1. Slack's pass to Norm Pratt added the extra point. The score was 7-0 at the quarter.

Late in the second quarter, Bearden knotted the count as QB Steve Oliver hit Bob Cox with a screen pass. The burly halfback rambled thirty yards for the score. Sophomore Dick Rosser kicked the extra point. Bearden scored midway in the

3rd quarter. QB Steve Oliver sneaked in from the one after a 54 yard punt by Ricky Lebo set the Bulldogs up there.

Then Holston started rolling. They showed a hard nosed ground attack as Captain Gary Childress and Fullback Eddie Treece slashed through the line for big yardage. QB Fair finally scored from the 3 making it 14-13 Bearden. On the all important extra point Fair tried an end sweep and was dropped on the 2, short of the goal.
