



New Dress Regulations



Mounties Overcome 16-Point Advantage

The East High Mountaineers, coming back from a 16-point deficit, defeated Memphis Treadwell 69-65 in the first round play of the State Tournament.

Mac Stalcup scored 21 points to lead the way. Eddie McElyea scored 16; Edd Poore and Bill Black trailed with 11 points each; Mickey Shelton had 10. Thus all five starters were in double figures.

The tall Memphis team, averaging 6 ft. 4 in. to the man, led the game until the middle of the fourth quarter. With 4:27 left, McElyea stole the ball and tied the score at 59 all.

Mac Stalcup brought East ahead for the first time with a score of 61-60. Poore then stole a pass made by Treadwell and dunked it, making the score 63-60. In the last two minutes the Mountaineers finished the game with six free throws.

This victory left all six teams from East Tennessee that had played with unblemished records. The Mountaineers advanced to play Hampton in the next round of the tournament.

East Tops Hampton With Six Overtimes

East surprised Hampton in a thrilling 46-44 six-overtime game, Thursday, March 15.

The longest game played in a State Basketball Tournament came to an end after 50 minutes of play when Mickey Shelton, who was scoreless the entire game, scored the winning two points.

The Mounties led at half time by a score of 26-22. From start to finish it was a see-saw game ending at 42-42. Getting the ball and running the clock out for one shot, both teams tried desperately to make the winning score. This lasted for four exciting overtimes until Jerry White, Hampton, was fouled and made two free throws. Hampton had the lead, but McElyea fixed the Warriors by coming right back with two points, making the score 44-44.

In the sixth overtime East's Mickey Shelton lost the ball, but Hampton knocked it out of bounds. Bill Black attempted a jump shot from the corner and missed with 18 seconds left. East gained the rebound and brought the ball back to Shelton, who won the game with a 15-footer from the foul circle.

Steve Sloan Sparks Bradley Triumph

East was beaten 60-55 by the state champs, Bradley County, in semi-final action of the state tournament. The Mounties fell behind early and never regained their old form.

The Bears were led by All-State guard, Steve Sloan, who scored 23 points. East was led by Edd Poore, who had 24 and Bill Black, who added 23. Big Edd also pulled down 17 rebounds but Bradley controlled the backboards 38-35.

The Mounties were behind 16-13 at the end of the 1st quarter but spurted and led 17-16 after 1 minute of the 2nd quarter. This was the last time the Mountaineers were ahead and at the end of the half it was 34-29, Bradley.

With 2:12 left in the 3rd period East pulled within 1 point at 38-37, however, Hewitt sparked the Bears and at the end of the 3rd it was 44-40.

In the last quarter the Mounties pulled within two at 48-46, but it was as close as they could come and Bradley was still on top at the end of the game.

Sparta Slides Past East For 3rd Place

Unable to maintain an early ten point lead, East was defeated by Sparta 59 to 51, giving them fourth place in the State Tournament.

Edd Poore netted 21 points while Conover was the second leading scorer with 12. Hewett boasted the Bears with his 25 points. Even though defeated, the boys played an exciting game.

In the first quarter Big Edd paced East with 10 points to make the score going into the second quarter 18 to 13. Sparta, however, found spark and closed the half out by the margin of 29 to 26.
