# Baseballers Enter League Play; Dickie Long Paces Flyboys

**OAK RIDGE, EAST, WEST**  
Mike Simmons led Oak Ridge to a victory over East and West April 12, at Evans Collins Field. Oak Ridge ran up 91 points; while East was second with 40. West accounted for 25 points. Simmons won first place in three events—the 180 yard low hurdles, high jump, and the broad jump. Sanders, Carroll Price and Fitchpatrick joined Simmons in leading Oak Ridge with the first places. Oak Ridge had 9 first places, while East was second with four and West had two first places. Dickie Long led East with first place in two events. Long won the 100 yard dash and the 200 yard dash. He also finished third in the broad jump. Arthur Marler and Lafe Thompson also led East with first places in the 120 yard high hurdles and discus. West's relay team won the 2 mile relay and Bo Mapp won the pole vault for West's only first place.

**OAK RIDGE, EAST**  
Oak Ridge, one of the leading track powers in the state, rolled over East 105 to 18 at Oak Ridge, April 12.

Mike Simmons again led Oak Ridge, this time by taking four first places. Mike won the high hurdles, high jump, low hurdles, and the broad jump. Robinson was the only other Oak Ridger to win more than one first place.

East didn't win any first places and only five second places. Arthur Marler, George Bible, Charles Lobetti, Ronnie Brown, and Lafe Thompson were the second place winners for East. Dickie Long, Tom King, and Herman Wayland won third places.

George Sanders beat out East's miler George Bible in a close race. Sanders won the mile with a very good time of 4:16.8 minutes.

## SIX RECORDS FALL ON CITY-COUNTY MEET

Fulton copped first place in the City-County Track Meet April 26 by taking 11 first places and 72 3/4 points. East came in second with 18 3/4 points to West High's 16 points. Central finished fourth with 15 3/4.

Records were broken in the 440 yard dash, mile run, mile relay, two-mile relay, pole vault, and the broad jump. Four records were broken by boys representing Farragut and West High.

Bill Cox, Babe Craig and Terrell Cliff were the only double winners.
