K.H.S. Meets Bristol Today In Dual Debate On Taxation

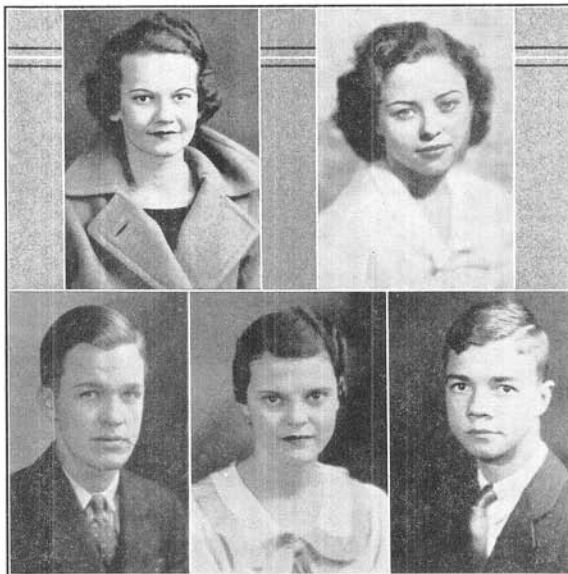

Damp Weather Hinders Annual Tennis Tourney

Ressler and Lavender Enter Semi-Finals By Impressive Victories.

April showers have seriously delayed the development of the K. H. S. tennis team and the completion of the annual tournament now in progress.

Members of the net squad have been unable to round into form, and many matches have been postponed in the tourney because the wet courts have been unsuitable for play.

The only upset recorded so far is the second-round defeat of P. B. Kuhlman, seeded No. 4, by Bill House. Both drew byes in the opening round, and then House subdued Kuhlman in straight sets, 6-3, 6-3.

Walt Lavender, seeded No. 2, and Bill Ressler, seeded No. 3, have reached the semi-finals after drawing byes in the first round. Lavender defeated Bob Shuey, 6-1, 6-0, and George Kriele, 7-5, 6-3. Ressler beat Shirley Jones, 6-1, 7-5, and Frank Thiele, 6-3, 7-5.

Doug Bean, seeded No. 1, is favored to meet Ressler in the semi-final of the upper bracket, while Lavender will probably oppose Charles Johnston in the lower bracket for a place in the finals. Johnston showed unusual form in defeating James Hassen, 12-10, 8-10, 6-1, in the hardest fought match of the meet.

The tennis team, composed of Bob Bogart, Marshall Neal, Vernon Grizzard, and the two finalists in the tournament, will probably play matches with Morrisston High and McCallie School of Chattanooga. Matches are also tentative with Asheville High and Baylor of Chattanooga.

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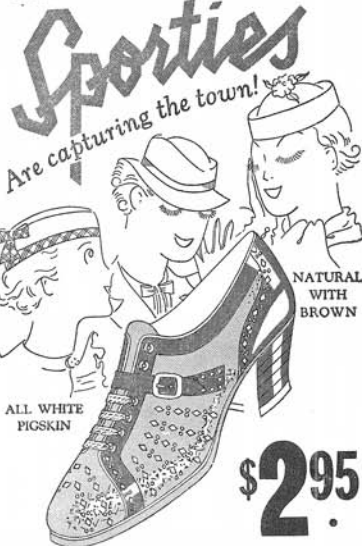
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
