All Knoxville Students To Receive Holiday For T. V. A. & I. Fair.

'Bird of Paradise', Rubin-Cherry Shows To Furnish Entertainment.

To give students a chance to "take in" the Tennessee Valley Agricultural and Industrial Fair, the Knoxville schools will be closed all day tomorrow. As usual, the day will be observed as School Day at the fair and all students purchasing tickets before noon will receive a special admission rate of fifteen cents.

Many varieties of entertainment and numerous exhibits of skill and art will be featured this year.

The open air show, or "free show" will be presented twice daily in the form of Thaviu's "Bird of Paradise", a musical revue composed of some thirty actors and actresses, including comedians, vaudeville artists, singers, and dancers. The company will also have its own symphony band.

The midway amusements will be furnished by the Rubin and Cherry Company, having twenty different shows and eighteen kinds of rides and thrills. The fireworks and horse show will complete the entertainment program.

Between twelve and fifteen East Tennessee counties will have displays representing various phases of East Tennessee projects. Among these will be a miniature reservoir and Morris Dam from Anderson County and exhibits showing the reservoir area in miniature from Campbell County. The latter county will also have a demonstration showing the process by which the erosion of soil and the restoring of barren soil to fertility takes place.

NO SPECIALIZATION IN BIBLE CLASS

That only a general view of the Old Testament without much specialization will be taught during the first terms of the Bible course, was decided Saturday by a committee of ministers and Mrs. Clarice Groh, K. H. S. Bible teacher.

Although the students will be expected to read the entire Old Testament, emphasis will be placed on the books of the Pentateuch and the major prophets with special attention given to the foundation books such as Genesis and Exodus.

The main object of the class is to impress upon the pupils that the Bible is a history of redemption from the fall of man to Christ.

Mrs. Groh said that the ministers hoped, if interest in the course remains as high as it now is, to introduce courses in which pupils may concentrate on one special part of the Bible.

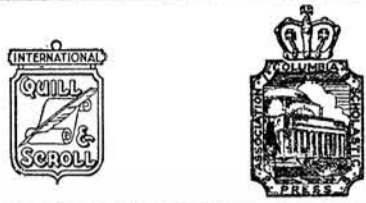

In other words, the Tennessee Valley Agricultural and Industrial Fair is but the World's Fair in miniature.

Whether you visited the World's Fair or not, don't fail to attend your own fair this week. Hundreds of dollars have been spent to make it the most interesting, most entertaining, most worthwhile, and most educational fair that Knoxville and East Tennessee has ever had. Don't miss it!

THE BOOKS WE READ

Quite as true as the old saying, "A man is known by the friends he keeps" is that of "A man is known by the books he reads." Even as a reveler would be likely to claim his friends among his fellow drinkers, so would a vile person be prone to prefer sensational literature; or, while a preacher would probably make friends of his church members, an erudite man would more than likely indulge in books of knowledge and learning. As a general rule, then, a person will prefer books that picture life as he lives it or would desire to live it, or those that deal with subjects in which he is particularly interested.

But should the reveler, for way of example, become an intimate friend of the preacher and cease to associate with his former companions, it is quite likely that he would soon give up drink entirely and live a useful and respectful life. On the other hand, should the erudite man come to read sensational literature in preference to his previous likings, he would, undoubtedly, find himself slipping from his former position of respect in a short time after this unwonted deviation. Thus it is quite obvious that books must be carefully chosen if they are to accomplish their purpose—namely, that of better fitting the reader for the kind of life he is to lead.

The pleasures and benefits derived from books are vividly and concisely proclaimed in the following short stanza:

"Books are keys to wisdom's treasures;;
Books are gates to lands of pleasure;
Books are paths that upward lead;
Books are friends; come, let us read."

If you have not already learned to enjoy reading, do so at once, for the joy and good obtained from books is without stint. Choose your books carefully. Remember that "variety is the spice of life", but at the same time bear in mind that too much ambiguity in your selection is fatal. Make frequent use of your school and public libraries. The habit of reading, once acquired, is not easily broken, as many readers have happily found.

START EARLY

The desire to become the leader in anything is probably instilled in the heart of everyone, but in most cases it lies dormant until brought to light by a great liking for some subject.

Take school work, for instance: Perhaps there are some students who care very little for the subjects they are taking. Still, it seems that an attempt should be made to become the best in whatever subject one is taking, whether he likes it or not.

An early start in school work is essential if one is to make a success of it. The whole foundation of the year's work is laid in the first two or three weeks. If one is not well versed in the fundamentals of a subject it is almost impossible to do any good when the more involved stages are reached.

It is only to be expected that in any institution the size of K. H. S. some time is required in getting down to work. However, by the end of the first week the school was running as smoothly as though it had been in progress for a month.
