Company 'C' Wins Monthly Inspection

Winning the monthly inspection Tuesday, Company "C" forged ahead of all rivals for twenty points toward becoming "prize company" this year. These points are awarded annually to the company scoring the highest in the monthly inspection during the year.

The standing of the four companies in the inspection Tuesday were as follows: Company "C", first, with a 88.2 rating; Company "B", second, with 87.3 points; Company "D", third, with a 83.4 showing; and Company "A", fourth, with 76.4.

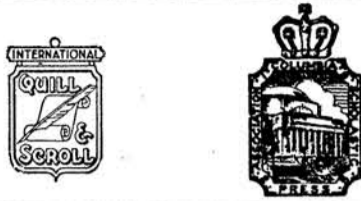

If there is any one thing which the American people as a whole really admire, it is fair play. They delight to see it is athletics, in politics, and in life in general. The stand for such an ideal has, undoubtedly, played a prominent part in the development of democracy and the United States knows and enjoys it.

As preparatory training to citizenship of the highest type, the public schools also teach fairness and square shooting. One of the initial purposes of education is to instill in the characters of young people this all-desirable trait. Has the effort been in vain?

During the past week, an incident occurred within the portals of K. H. S. which threatens to hold out an affirmative answer to the general public.

Knoxville high school has always believed in trusting her students. Seldom has this trust been broken. With the final Miss K. H. S. election, however, came a blot on our Alma Mater's reputation which will undoubtedly be difficult to wipe out.

The student body as a whole is not responsible for this disgrace. If the truth were known, only a very few unscrupulous students made it necessary that the remainder of the election be held in group rooms under the watchful eye of the group teachers. Yet the entire school must face the adverse public opinion which will inevitably result, as well as must be deprived of such a degree of freedom as is desirable in public high schools.

Truly, rain falls on the just and unjust alike; the broiling sun of blame seems also to discriminate very slightly between its victims.

"Men are four:

- He who knows and knows not that he knows—
He is asleep—awake him;
- He who knows not and knows not that he knows not—
He is a fool—shun him;
- He who knows not and knows that he knows not—
He is a child—teach him;
- He who knows and knows that he knows—

There is only one excuse for the existence of a system of public schools, for the expenditure of millions of dollars annually on education institutions, and for young people's spending the first two decades of their life in study, namely, that this third and most numerous class of those who "know not and know that they know not" may be converted into those "who know and know that they know". The fate of democracy rests on the outcome of this endeavor. Progress and education are one and inseparable. "Give the people light and they will find their own way".

Yours it is to remain a child or to become a king. You have the opportunity of reaching the latter level. You owe it to yourself and to your country to make the most of your opportunities. Others are depending on you. Will you disappoint them? Take your pick.
