Admission to this annual "backward" affair will be 50 cents, stage or couple. Bill Pollock and his Band will furnish the music during the evening.

## Scholarship Trip To Europe Offered

A scholarship trip to Europe next summer, with all expenses paid, will be awarded to the person who writes the best essay entitled, "Why I Would Like to Go Hostelling in Europe."

The winner in nation-wide competition for this trip will join one of the supervised groups sponsored by American Youth Hostels and will spend eight weeks abroad. He will have his choice of trips to the British Isles, Central Europe, or France and the Rhineland.

### Winner to Sail July 15

Regardless of which group the winner selects, he will sail about June 15 and will return about September 15. Going as a member of an AYH group means that he will cover some distances by train and ship, but the greater part of his trip will consist of hostelling.

The competition for the trip is open to U. S. citizens who have reached the age of 17 by July 1, 1951.

### Words: 1000 or Less

Entrants may use any number of words they choose in their essays up to 1,000. Entries must be postmarked not later than April 15, 1951. The winner will be notified by mail within two weeks and his name will be announced in the Summer, 1951, issue of "Hostelling" magazine.

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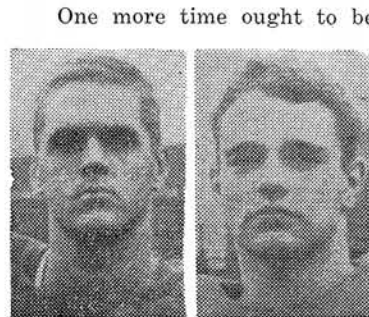

### Apache Party Planned

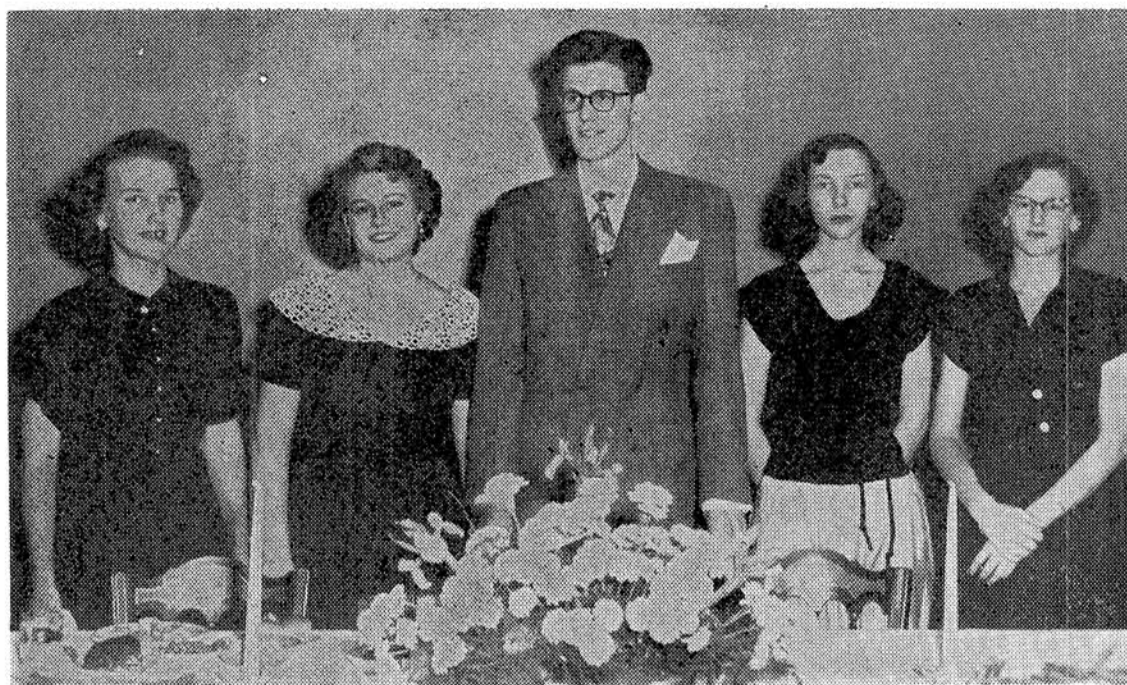
