

Tournament Begins Next Week

County Hands Blues First Defeat on Home Court Outlasting Late Trojan Rally By a 55-52 Score

A spirited Knox High rally fell just 3 points short of overcoming Central's third period lead as the Bobcats outlasted the Trojans in a 55-52 thriller in a gym jam-packed with a screaming mob of fans, witnessing the first defeat for the Trojans on their home court.

The rivalry between these two schools ended in typical City-County style—a fight to the finish.

Central opened the scoring and commenced to build a 2-11 point lead at the end of the first quarter. At half-time the Bobcats led by only 8 points, but by the end of the third period had built up a 44-33 margin.

Trojans Rally at End

The Trojans came back strong in the last period, scoring 20 points while holding the Fountain Citians to 11. They almost succeeded in overcoming the seemingly impossible lead, as for once in the game the Trojans were able to hit consistently. The clock ran out for the Blues with the score still showing 3 points between the teams.

Captain Billy Lovelace lead the victors with 18 points followed by Lynn Johnson with 15 and Helton with 10.

Three Tie

J. D. Byington, Barry McKinnon, and Bill Hall topped the Trojan attack with 10 points apiece. J. D. hit each of his in the first half, while Hall and McKinnon scored most of theirs during the Trojan rally. Buddy Cruze hit for 8 points, Bobby Fry 7, Dewey Thomas 5, and Testerman 2. These four aided in the attempt to catch Central.

The Cats hit 41% from the floor while the Trojans hit a weak 27%. The win, 19th for Central against 3 defeats, puts Central in first place in the Knoxville Big 7.

"B" Team Wins

Budd Cruze went wild in the B-game, scoring 25 points. Pat Scruggs hit 18 as the Baby Trojans rolled over the Baby Bobcats 60-36.

Soddy-Daisy Invades KHS

Knoxville High School will be invaded tonight by the Soddy-Daisy basketball team who will be seeking revenge from their earlier defeat on their home court in December.

The Soddy-Daisy team has been disqualified from the TSSAA tournament because of the disgraceful conduct of their fans during a game early in the season.

The starting lineup of KHS will probably be Fry and Testerman at forward, Byington at center, and Hall and McKinnon at guards.

The Trojans are working hard to get in shape for the District Tournament which begins Monday night. Knoxville High will play its first game in the tournament Tuesday.

Capt. Bill Hall Hopes For Trojan Win

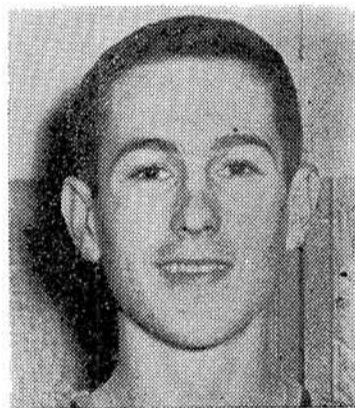

"We're going to try very hard to win the District tournament and go as far as we can in the others," said Bill Hall, who holds the very distinguished honor of being the last captain of a KHS basketball team.

"At least we would like to get as far as last year's team did. It would be good if we could win the championship since this is the last year." With that the Captain clammed up and wouldn't talk any more on the subject of who's going to win tournaments.

But with considerable prodding this reporter dug out further information about the last roundball captain to wear a Trojan basketball uniform.

Bill Hall has 17 years of life already behind him. During that time he has managed to distribute somewhere around 160 pounds over his 6 feet frame. He matriculated



in KHS after serving three years at Christenberry Junior High. (Bill was scholastically well known there—he was president of the honor society.)

At KHS Bill Hall played on the basketball B-team his first year and played on the varsity of last year's finalist team. This year he has been the most dependable Trojan player on the squad and was recently named to the Knoxville Journal first string All-City Team.

Central Game Bad

"I think probably our best game this year was the first game with Kingsport—and we lost that one," said Bill in answer to a question. He thinks that either one of the Central games or the last Catholic game could be classified as the Trojans' "worst" game. "We just weren't any good on those nights," says he.

His plans for the future are rather uncertain but he would like to further his knowledge at some college—probably U. T.—if the draft doesn't get him—which it probably will—along with the rest of us oppressed young men.

Catholic Seeded First; Possibility of One More Trojan-Bobcat Game

Catholic High School has been seeded first in the annual Sixth District High School basketball tournament, just barely edging the Central High Bobcats by a 7-6 vote of the coaches.

The tournament is to be held February 26-March 3 at the Chilhowee Sports Arena. Coach Ralph Hutchins of Rule High is the tournament director. Knoxville High was seeded third and Rule High fourth.

Three games will be played each night, the first starting at 6 p. m., except Saturday when there will be two games—the boys' finals and the girls' finals.

Seeded Teams Draw Byes

The Nos. 1 and 4 seeded teams were placed in the upper bracket while Nos. 2 and 3 went in the lower bracket. All seeded teams have byes in the first round. This means that both Knoxville High and Central, if both get through the first round, will not get to go to the Regional tournament the following week. The two district finalists are permitted to go but if both teams advance to the semi-finals, which will be Friday night, either the Trojans or the Bobcats will have to drop out.

WKGN will broadcast the boys' games with Bill Sorrell at the mike. Admission will be fifty cents for students and seventy-five for adults. An all-star team will be selected by a special committee of coaches, sports writers, and announcers.

Trojans vs. Bobcats

There is a strong chance that the Knoxville High School Trojans will meet the Central High Bobcats again. Central is the only team to beat the Biblemen twice and the only team to defeat the Trojans on their home court.

Knoxville should reach the semi-finals easily since they will have to play either Bearden or South Knoxville. But the Bobcats will have to conquer the winner of the Stair-Young game to meet the Trojans in the semi-finals.

Bill Hall and Barry McKinnon played their usual great game, leading the Trojan scoring and setting up many plays that produced points for the Blues. Hall tallied for 19 points while McKinnon scored 13. Kyle Testerman added 10 points to the Trojan cause and Bobby Fry hit for 9. Buddy Cruze, J. D. Byington, and Dewey Thomas rounded out the scoring with 2 points apiece.

Lingerfelt led the losers with 17 points and Jones scored 10 for Morristown.

The win was the second of the season for the Biblemen over the Hurricanes and was the last game for the Trojans away from home. The Trojans are now tied for second place in the Knoxville Big 7 with Catholic High.
