KHS French Instructor Studied Languages Abroad

FTA teacher of the month is Mrs. Cornelia Payne, matriarch of room 310.

Mrs. Payne was born at 4407 Kingston Pike (still her home) which is a beautiful old house that was built before the Civil War. At different times during the War the house was used as a Confederate or Yankee hospital. On the plaster under the paper in the room in which Mrs. Payne was born are still to be found messages written by Civil War soldiers.

Studied Abroad

After finishing college, Mrs. Payne went to Switzerland and "gay Paree" where she studied languages for a year at the Sorbonne. She returned home to teach French at KHS. She received her Master's Degree in French at the University of Tennessee.

Mrs. Payne was married after she had taught a year and a half at KHS. She has a son and a daughter who are both KHS alumni. Her daughter, Mrs. C. B. Clark, graduated from U. T. and is now teaching at Bearden High School. Her son, "Sandy", is a student at the University of Tennessee and is in the Naval Reserve. Mrs. Payne and her two children are members of the First Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Payne has been an active leader in the Children of the Confederacy, an organization that is sponsored by the United Daughters of the Confederacy. In KHS she has sponsored the French Club which, and in cooperation with the Junior Red Cross, has been in charge of collecting funds to be sent to the school's adopted European orphans—Mia and Rene.

TSPA Convention At U-T; Mr. W. Tucker Is In Charge

Annual TSPA Convention will be held at the University of Tennessee, April 6-7, with Mr. Willis Tucker head of the Journalism department in charge of the convention.

Group sessions on a variety of topics to be discussed by newspapermen and journalism teachers will begin immediately after the registration period. At 10 a. m. the sessions will include talks on feature writing, sports writing, headlines, and freshening up untimely stories. 11 a. m. will bring up subjects on typographical effectiveness, editorial writing, complete news coverage, advertising copy, and common faults in writing.

Afternoon Session

At 1:30 p. m. the subjects of talks will include objective news writing, press photography or picture editing, newspaper makeup, and problems of financing. From 2:30 p. m. until 4 p. m. panel discussions will be conducted in separate groups for editors, business staff, feature and column writers, and sports staff.

Annual Dinner 6:00 P. M.

At the annual dinner, scheduled for 6 p. m., several brief talks will be made by newspaper representatives, and entertainment features will be presented. After dinner, while the banquet room is being cleared for the square dance, a tour of the Knoxville Journal plant will be conducted.

A square dance will begin immediately afterward and will continue until 11:30 or 12:00 p. m.

11:00 a. m. on Saturday morning has been set aside for the announcement of paper ratings and business matters. From 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. individual criticisms of printed newspapers will be given. Staffs not occupied may see the News-Sentinel plant during this time.

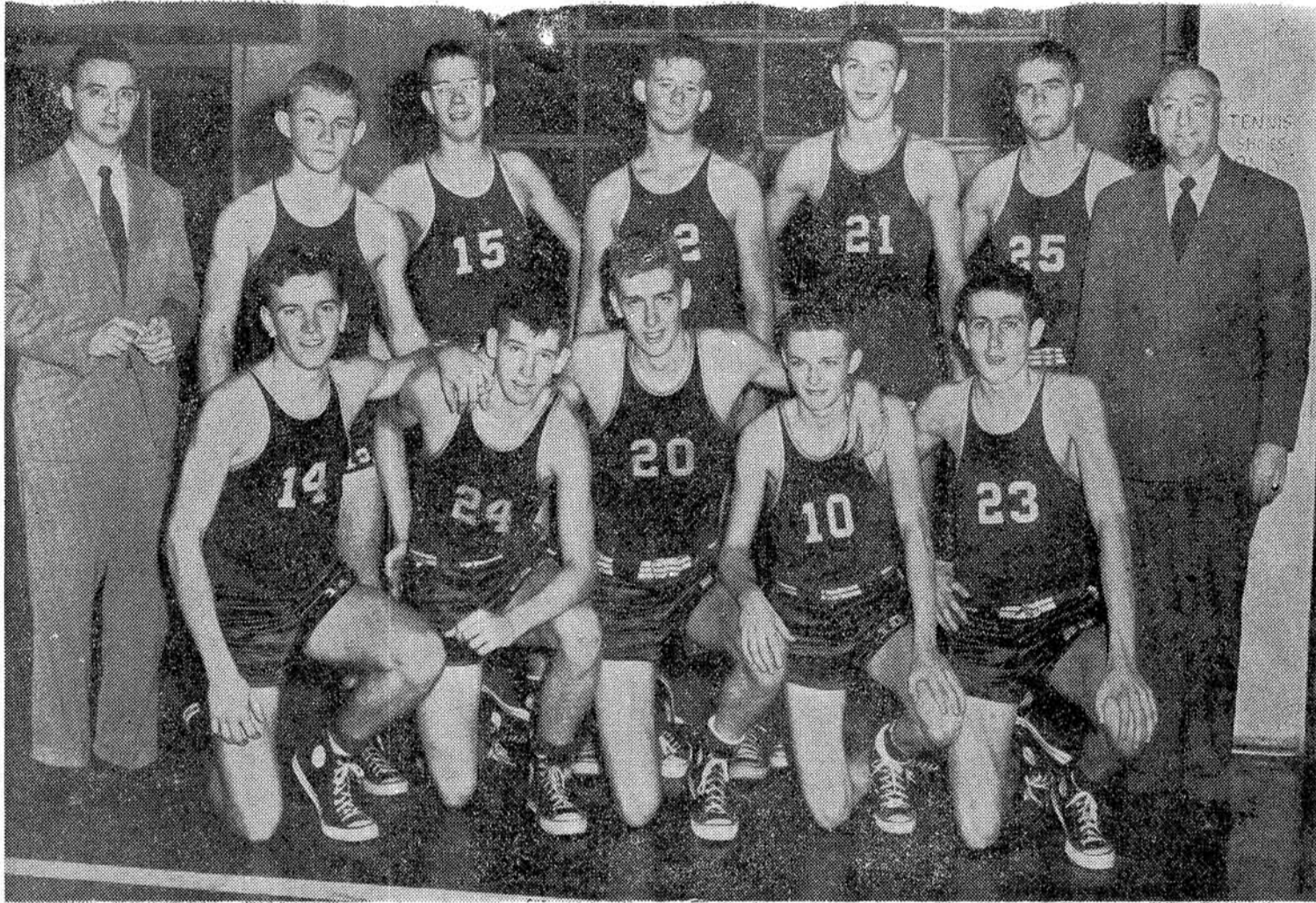

It's a little late but I'm going to talk about it anyway. After all, it's one of the best things that could have happened to High School this last year. . .

KHS—Gone to the State Tournament five times and went to the finals every time. They were champions in 1939-41-51, runnersup in 1938-50. These five times are more than any other high school has ever gone. Father Ryan of Nashville went four times. KHS and Selmer were favorites before the tournament and they're the two that were in the finals. . .

Something Mr. Turley gave me: The Nashville Banner predicted that Knox High and Chattanooga Central would be in the finals; also, same paper predicted that Chattanooga Central would win even though KHS had beaten them during the season. At least they were 50% correct.

KHS has a record of only one loss in 20 tournament games of 1950-1951. This year their final record was 26 wins against 5 losses.

Byington came through when it was necessary. He was the best player on the court in the finals of the District tournament and led the Trojans to victory against Selmer. He should make good at U. T. Bob Fry really put on a great show at Nashville, doing such a fine job that he was selected All-State again. You can bet it was hard to reach that form after only two or three weeks' practice. He probably the only KHS athlete to be All-State in both football and basketball. Buddy Cruze did a grand job of relief work. When he and Fry were in the game, the opponents seldom ever saw the ball. Cruze, by the way, ran the hurdles for the first time in his life and pulled down a second and a third in a track meet last Saturday. He could be mighty valuable in helping the Blue retain their state track championship. Eddie Taylor who saw two or three of the KHS games, got on the radio almost as much as the players did. Bill Sorrell was always saying, "And there goes Eddie Taylor over there to shake hands with Bill Hall," or something of that sort. McKinnon certainly deserved that trip to Florida for his great playing and for winning first string All-State honors. Like I said at the start of the season, "Bill Hall and Barry McKinnon are the best set of guards in the State." Testerman amazed fans with his left-

handed push shot. He came through several times to take the pressure off the Trojans. Dewey Thomas turned in his usual good performance when he was in there, and Pat Scruggs did some excellent relief work.

Now all we need is a State Track Championship. Although we got beat in the first meet, some such as Eddie Taylor still think we can do it.
