All entries which were rated were presented with a certificate stating which class they were in and a set of papers stating how the paper could be improved upon as seen by the three judges.

A Junior Girl will represent Knoxville High at the annual Girls Volunteer State, June 8-15, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary at Ward Belmont College, Nashville, Tennessee.

The KHS faculty and the former Girls' State'er will nominate four outstanding girls from the 1951 Junior class. Tuesday morning all Juniors will vote in home groups for one representative. The girl receiving the highest number of votes will be the delegate from KHS. In case the first chosen will not be able to attend, the runner-up will serve as alternate.

Trojans Set New Track Record To Capture Knoxville Relays



The KHS track team took first place in the Knoxville Relays, April 7, at Evans-Collins, setting a new track record in the process.

The most outstanding event was the 440 yard relay. The Trojan relay team composed of George Christensen, Eddie Taylor, Pete Monroe, and Allen Jameson burned up the track, setting a new meet record of 46.5 seconds, almost two seconds less than the former record held by KHS and Kingsport.

Cop Six Firsts

The team trophy was awarded to the Trojans, who took six firsts and massed 36 points by the Knoxville News-Sentinel. Coach Sharp's boys copped the shot put, the 180 low hurdles, the 100 yard dash, the 440 relay, the sprint relay, and the 880 relay. John Hall won the shot put for the Trojans; Buddy Rhea the 180 yard low hurdles; and George Christensen the 100 yard dash. The combined efforts of Christensen, Taylor, Monroe and Jameson won the 440 relays; Hall, Taylor, Jameson, and Monroe the sprint medley relay; and Jameson, Taylor, Monroe, and Christensen the 880 relay. Buddy Cruze grabbed a fourth place in the high jump and third in the hurdles. Charles Heffner took fourth place in shot put and Hall came in fourth in the 100 yard dash.

John Hall kept up his good work at the shot, winning this event for High School. Heffner placed third in the shotput. In the discus Jay Bayless was first and L. B. McClary second. Hall finished third in the discus. Sunny McCowan tied Harold Bolton for the pole vault title.

In all, the Trojans collected 85 points to Oak Ridge's 74. Kingsport finished last with 8 points.
