East High won the Sportsmanship Trophy given by the Knoxville Optimist Club. A surprise assembly in honor of this award was held with Mr. Roscoe Ward, president of the Uptown Optimist Club, speaking to the student body. The trophy, which was awarded for good sportsmanship, was accepted by Coach Polston from Mr. C. M. Callis, public relations representative of Southern Bell Telephone Company.

Also present on the stage were Mr. Greg Benson, Mr. Joel Huffaker, Mr. Earl White, Mr. J. B.

Hollingsworth, and Mr. John Montgomery.

Beginning in 1952 going to 1966, fifteen schools have received the trophy: Fulton — 1952, 1961, and 1963; Young — 1953, 1957, and 1958; Powell — 1954 and 1956; South — 1955; East — 1959 and 1966; Central — 1960 and 1965; and T.S.D. — 1963 and 1964.

## Mounties Stand 7-3 In League

East dropped its first league game 10-4 to Fulton. Jimmy Lee was the winning pitcher and Andy Worsham, the loser.

The Mounties walloped Austin 14-0 behind the hitting of McGhee, Lail, and Smith. Albert Alexander twirled a one-hitter.

Holston stunned East 2-1 behind the pitching of Ronnie Brewer. This marked the first East loss to Holston in five years.

Mike Daniels' squeeze bunt scored Barry Lail, giving East a 1-0 victory over Catholic. Dennis Troutman gained the mound decision.

East turned back Carter 6-2, raising their league record to 3-2. Barry Lail had two hits for the Mounties. The winning pitcher was Andy Worsham.

East slipped by Gibbs 5-4 with Gary McGhee and Andy Worsham supplying the punch. Albert Alexander won his second game.

Fulton dropped East 3-1 behind the pitching of Jimmy Lee. Jim Russell led Fulton with three hits. Gary McGhee had East's only hit.

Behind some strong bats, East stomped Austin 12-0. Gary McGhee, Dwight Smith, and Kenny Spears provided the fireworks. The winning hurler was Dennis Troutman.

## Five Receive Scholarships

Five East High footballers have been awarded sports scholarships this year. The grants, four to Tennessee schools, were presented to Don Gossett, Bob Wright, Henry Ruth, Gary McKinney, and Dick Padgett.

Don Gossett, All-American, will play for Bear Bryant's Crimson Tide at the University of Alabama this fall. Don, who weighs 200 pounds plus, played tackle for four years.

At the end of the line this year were Henry Ruth and Gary McKinney. Both were awarded grants to Tennessee universities, Henry Ruth to the University of Tennessee, Martin Branch, and Gary McKinney, Knoxville College.

Hard-running fullback Dick Padgett, who came through with many clutch plays for the Mounties, will play for the Carson-Newman Eagles. Dick made the "Padgett-up-the-middle" play an old reliable in East's offense last season.

Bob Wright, a partner in East's backfield, will enroll at Vanderbilt University next fall. He proved his worth as a hard-hitting half-back during East's strong 8-2 season.

## Mountie Set Three Records

The track team has finished its regular season this year with a 12-1 win-lose record with its only loss coming at the hands of Oak Ridge by a margin of five points. The team was lead by Paul Daniels, Ray Humphrey, and Steve Nelson in total points scored with 148, 143, 138 1/2 points respectively. Steve also won twenty-five first-place individual events during the season.

Three school records were broken this year by the Mounties. Albert Robinson set a record pole vault with a soar of 11 feet 6 inches; Dick Padgett, Donnell Solomon, Eddie Johnson, and Paul Daniels set a 440-yard relay record with a time of 45.7 seconds; Bob Wright broke the discus record with a throw of 143 feet and 2 inches.

The East team won first place in the KIL, fifth place in the News-Sentinel Relays, first place in the City-County meet and sixth place in the SIC. After the City-County meet, Miss Sharon Jones was named Knox Inter-scholastic Track Queen.

### 114 Students Record Perfect Attendance

Gary Hillard, Jerry Hillard, and Dwight Smith have not missed a day since starting at East four years ago. With an enrollment of 575 students, 114 of them have perfect attendance this year. Juniors had 42 with no absence; sophomores, 33; seniors, 24; and freshmen, 15. The school's attendance record is over 96% for the year. Within the secondary schools, Young and East have the highest attendance percentages.
