George Hoge Sandbagged On Way Home Monday Night; Robber Leaves No Trace.

George Hoge, popular Junior of Mr. Richard Jones' group, was knocked senseless and robbed of about eighteen dollars last Monday night.

George was going to his home, 407 East Fourth avenue, after collecting on his Journal route. While walking along Fourth Avenue between Deery and Morgan streets at about 7:30 p. m., he felt someone's hands cover his mouth and at the same time he was struck on the head. This was the last George remembered until he regained consciousness about 9:00 p. m. and went to his home.

The blow was struck presumably with a sandbag as the skin was not broken. However, George had a severe headache that lasted all Monday night.

Owing to the fact that there were no witnesses, and George did not see his assailant since he was attacked from behind, no trace of the footpad has been found.

RESIGNATION OF BENDER IS BLOW TO ATHLETICS

Coach W. W. McCollum to Succeed Bender As Baseball Mentor of Season.

The resignation of Coach John R. Bender, Physical Director of the city schools and head coach of athletics in Knoxville High School which was presented to the Board of Education Monday, is a severe blow to athletics in K. H. S. where his expert baseball tutelage will be missed this year.

Bender came to Knoxville in 1916 as coach of the University of Tennessee to succeed Coach Clevenger. In 1920 Bender was succeeded by M. B. Banks as head of the coaching staff at U. T., and took up duties as athletic director of that institution. Bender came to Knoxville High School in 1922 and during the three years which he has coached here has put out one state championship football team, a baseball team in 1922 that claimed the Southern title and a phenomenal basket-ball team last year which played and won 19 consecutive games. He has put Knoxville High School on the map generally as an athletic institution.

No permanent successor to Coach Bender has been selected. However, Mr. W. W. McCollum will coach the baseball team for the remainder of the season. McCollum who is a Carnegie Technician and who is now doing part time work at the University of Tennessee, will receive the support of the entire school in producing our line of champions.

ARTISTS VIEW FAMOUS WORKS

Miss Clay of U. T. Gives Talk In Connection With Art Exhibit.

Last Monday, March 30, the art classes of Knoxville High School were excused the seventh and eighth periods to attend an exhibit of students work at the University of Tennessee from the Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, N. Y. The invitation to attend this exhibit came through Miss Mary Clay, art teacher at the University.

Miss Clay gave a very interesting talk in explanation of the work which was varied and very interesting. There were designs from the simplest rosettes and unit designs to borders and "all over" patterns of exquisite hue. Many of these were worked out in tempera (poster color) in imitation of fabrics and mosaics.

Lovely stained glass windows as well as stage settings and tapestries in rich colors were there. Costume designs made from motifs derived from vases and other art objects were most interesting.

The designs that interested and attracted the high school students most were the lovely posters for plays, etc., of which there were a great many; and the illustrations in water color for well known stories and songs. The lettering on these were especially well done and the color was clear and brilliant.
